Title	AAMDC Resolution – Gravel Pit Reclamation				
Proposed Motion	That Council endorse the recommended resolution regarding gravel pit reclamation and refer it to the October 17, 2016, Alberta Association of Districts and Counties (AAMDC) Pembina Zone Meeting for consideration.

Report	Background Information				
	 This Request for Decision is the follow-up to the above item, whereby the enclosed resolution is recommended for Council consideration to be referred to the October 17, 2016, AAMDC Pembina Zone Meeting. The resolution speaks to the Provincial Code of Practice for Gravel Pits, whereby gravel pits that came into operation prior to August 15, 1978, in Alberta are exempt from requiring a reclamation plan to be developed every five years, which creates issues with enforcement and certainty regarding reclamation. The resolution suggests that relevant legislation be amended to establish similar requirements for all gravel pits, regardless of when the were established, with the aim of providing greater certainty for residents around reclamation timelines and requirements. Moreover, with review of the Community Aggregate Payment (CAP) Levy as part of the <i>Municipal Government Act (MGA)</i> review later in 2016 and early 2017, the resolution suggests that changes to the levy could result in direct, open funding for reclamation efforts and research In essence, if the levy were to be adjusted to a higher rate, municipalities could remain entitled to the revenues generated from the current rate (\$0.25 per tonne), and anything above this could be directed towards reclamation of orphaned and abandoned gravel pit sites. 				

	 The initial intent in the development of the CAP Levy was that monies received from it be directed to communities and infrastructure affected by sand and gravel activity. The current CAP Levy is set to expire December 31, 2017. As part of the <i>MGA</i> Review, the Alberta Sand and Gravel Association is lobbying for a centralized authority to collect and disperse CAP Levy monies, with a percentage of CAP monies allocated to research reclamation techniques and the reclamation of orphaned and abandoned sites. The Association's position is largely informed by the concern that funds raised through the CAP Levy are not necessarily being direct and openly invested back into projects for affected communities and infrastructure. The proposed resolution suggests that the AAMDC lobby the Province to explore opportunities to allocate a portion of future funds received from the levy towards reclamation efforts, <i>if</i> the current levy amount collected by municipalities were adjusted to reflect current conditions. The current Community Aggregate Payment Levy amount is \$0.25/tonne and has not been adjusted since 2006. In 2015, Sturgeon County collected \$685,439 from the levy, with majority of the funds being distributed as follows: West Sturgeon Agricultural Society: \$43,265 Villeneuve Athletic Association: \$43,265 Calahoo-Villeneuve Eligible Applicants Reserve: \$40,929 Community Services Advisory Board: \$41,317 County Nominated Projects (Calahoo Hall Project): \$400,000.
